Two decades in a musical parterre

2009

Twenty years ago, small town music festivals were as scarce as hens' teeth - nowadays there is a plethora of activity.

How can the audiences, the funding and the appetite be sustained? With finesse the Port Fairy Spring Music Festival has sustained itself, within an all-too-brief weekend, to iterate with refreshing inspiration and variety.

It was the combination of three musical minds that fertilised the seed: Eda Ritchie seeking to encourage visitors to the town and Michael Easton and Len Vorster toying with the prospect of a musical weekend in an appealing town - perhaps a leaf out of Britten and Pears' book at Aldeburgh!

Of the first festival The Age music critic Kenneth Hince's and arts editor Michael Shmith's reviews were uncompromisingly laudatory, with the latter presciently suggesting "Port Fairy already has the right conditions to propagate a proper festival".

The hope for another festival in 1991 was easily accomplished by Easton's deft handling of artists and Len's sheet anchor role at the piano. Hince was astounded at the low total cost of attending every concert during the weekend, while the diversity of composition, the competence of performers and imagination in the program caused the critic to suggest the festival "should become a connoisseur's choice". Michael and Len's capacity and work to provide a varied series of artists for each year was extraordinary, while the programming would always produce material rarely heard, premiere performances or combinations of musical repertoire.

Jennifer Whitehead headed the team for the millennium and the Festival was ambitiously diverted in a new direction with overseas government and corporate support - for Japanese, Swiss, United Kingdom and Italian themes. This brought Swiss brown cows, ice creams and watches, taiko drummers on freezing pavements, and diplomatic security to the mix, together with increased audience. Michael's health however was deteriorating, and sadly he died in February 2004.

Stephen McIntyre's acceptance of the role of Festival Director in 2005 was a vital change that provided performance opportunities for younger emerging artists together with their established colleagues, in a range of stimulating and varied programs. With Paul Clarkson at the helm, the focus has been on sustainability based on growing audience numbers. Despite being constrained by appropriate but small audience venues, the desire to provide a high quality event, rather than risk dilution from an extended performance period, or growth to demonstrate "vitality" has been a paramount virtue of the weekend.

Patrons over the two decades have experienced some wonderful musical moments, had a lot of fun and returned to an extraordinary environment that marries the original concept with an experience of "what a festival should be". Long may it continue.

Stuart Greenbaum: Anniversary Festival Composer-in-Residence



"I often conceive of music in terms of journeys, but I also believe that music should be appreciable as pure, abstract sound in time. Either way, my music aims to evoke an atmosphere apart from the routine of modern life.

"I believe in the need to cultivate space in a world increasingly filled with commercialism, light and noise pollution and 24/7 thinking. At times, I think we lose a sense of wonderment at our earthly surrounds. Therefore, when I write, I seek an experience in sound to take me beyond mundane imperatives."

Stuart Greenbaum was born in Melbourne in 1966 and studied composition with Brenton Broadstock and Barry Conyngham at the University of Melbourne, where he is now Head of Composition. Nelson, a three-act opera written with long-time collaborator, poet Ross Baglin, was premiered at the 2007 Castlemaine State Festival. Current commissions include works for Southern Cross Soloists, Duo Sol and a new dramatic work for Victorian Opera. Greenbaum was a Featured Composer at the 2006 Aurora Festival in Western Sydney, and in addition to Port Fairy, he will be Composer-in-Focus at the 2009 Bangalow Music Festival.

He has won a number of awards, including the Dorian Le Galliene Composition Award, the Heinz Harant Prize and the Albert H. Maggs Composition Award. 90 Minutes Circling the Earth won 'Orchestral Work of the Year' at the 2008 Classical Music Awards.

Stuart describes his piece Falling By Degrees as "a contemplation of gravity in seven miniatures for violin and piano".

Many people consider the Nelson Mass to be Haydn's greatest liturgical work and indeed one of his masterpieces in any form. Haydn wrote it in 1798 and titled it Mass in Times of Trouble, referring to the Austrian defeat in several battles by Napoleon. The "Nelson" nickname was bestowed on it when Nelson defeated Napoleon at the Battle of the Nile. Trumpets, timpani and strings make a wonderful background for Haydn's thrilling choral music.

The program also includes Stuart Greenbaum's choral work celebrating Coventry Cathedral, victim of another European war.

A welcome return to the Festival by the wonderful Choir of Trinity College.

Barry Tuckwell is widely regarded as the greatest horn player of his generation, having worked for decades with the finest orchestras and conductors in the world.

Sweet and versatile in the upper register whilst open and gruff in its lower tones, the ophicleide is wholly individual in character and temperament. Nick Byrne, who also plays trombone in the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, is the world authority on this lost instrument. Here he is accompanied by pianist and Festival Co-founder Len Vorster.

The Flinders Quartet has developed into a highly respected force in Australian chamber music. Building on their 2006 Limelight Award as "amongst Australia's most influential artists", the quartet was also nominated for a 2007 ARIA award.
