MOSAIC - the ancient practice of assembling thousands of tiny pieces into an exquisitely unified image multi-faceted, textural, and an artwork much greater than the sum of its parts. In 2025 PFSMF explores the metaphorical symbolism of MOSAIC to represent the unique threads of our individual human DNA, bloodlines and heritage; to rejoice in the miracle of how millions of notes in the hands of master musicians are crafted into stunning sonic stories; and to pay homage to the Ancient Greek origins of the word itself, which celebrates the inspiration of the Muses in all artistic endeavours. We unveil a boundless spectrum of pigments - from the familiar wavelengths of Mozart, Chopin, Schubert, Liszt, Sibelius, Brahms, Bizet, Bach and Beethoven - to the nuanced tones of Stravinsky, Poulenc, Albeniz, Messiaen, Mompou, Schulz-Evler, Britten, Prokofiev, and Korngold - from the lustre of Piazzolla, Gade, Agri, Carli, Lecuona, and Nazareth - to the blushing shades of Bartók, Crumb, Skalkottas, Khachaturian, Tan Dun, Hosokawa, Ngurah, Seletsky, and Lutosławski. We marvel at the antique dyes of Purcell, Lully, Scarlatti, Colombi, Cabezón, Jiménez, Seixas, Anglés, Milano, Attaingnant, Visée, Erlebach, Abel, Piccinini, Fischer, Kapsperger, Dowland, and Pachelbel - and at many so ancient, we have no name by which to call them. Our prism is brightly burnished with the breathtakingly fresh hues of Elena Kats-Chernin, Aaron Wyatt, Alma Mahler, Rebecca Clarke, John Zorn, Kate Moore, Maria Grenfell, Kaija Saariaho, Anne Leilehua Lanzilotti, Marc-André Hamelin, Nicholas Pollock, Wally Gunn, Kym Alexandra Dillon, Stefan Cassomenos, Paul Dean, Lee Bradshaw, and Neeharika Shyju - including four to be witnessed by you for the very first time. Our 2025 grand tour of the mosaic of musical heritages begins in Noongar country, deep in the Southwest sanctum of the world's oldest continent, as solo violist Christopher Moore and Festival strings conjure Aaron Wyatt's heartfelt evocation of dewy mornings, flowering banksias, and the hues of an ageless landscape dotted with red gums. We then glide into the world's most-loved Aussie vocalise, Eliza Aria from Elena Kats-Chernin's ballet Wild Swans, featuring ascendant star soprano Mia Robinson. Virtuoso classical accordionist James Crabb and Festival Co-Director Stefan Cassomenos team up for Lutosławski's adrenalin-charged incarnation of everybody's favourite Paganini caprice, and are then joined by esteemed colleagues for an arrangement of an adaptation based on a fantasy on Bizet's famous frenzy of Spanish Gypsy blockbusters. Our Festival opener concludes with Brahms' own moment of Gypsy extravaganza indulgence, with its peak-Hungarian turbocharged Rondo alla Zingarese finale, completing our tracklist of delectable ingredients for a dazzling gala - never to be forgotten!

Dreaming of tens of thousands of years of human history, we find ourselves on the sacred Western Victorian sandstone of Gariwerd with the phenomenal artistry of Amos Roach's *Petyan*, a narrative of a thousand generations of springtimes; whilst in medieval Italy, amongst the Roman ruins, a wandering trovatore strums an anonymous tune of indeterminable age and origin on his theorbo, then pens a newly imagined *Fantasia* or *Ricercar*, unwittingly laying the foundations for centuries of harmonic and melodic invention; Mozart picks up the thread, creating one of his most treasured gifts to humanity; a young Alma Mahler is inspired to masterfully set poetry by Dehmel, Hartleben, Falke, Rilke and Heine and waits 10 years before her husband allows her to publish; finally, Seletsky reunites us with the musical embodiment of centuries of displacement and migration – and we keep dreaming, of tens of thousands of years of human history.



RUTH ROSHAN: SALON NOIR

JOURNEY TO THE HEART OF EUROPE

Ruth Roshan tells a great story of her first encounter with live Argentinean Tango in Paris at the age of 23 - of what must have been an unimaginably powerful experience for a young classical mandolinist from Warrnambool. Fast forward to now, and with her many ensembles including Tango Noir and Chamber Noir, she has recorded four albums of melodic tango-inspired pieces and songs, toured the world, and gathered an exceptional group of musicians around her in the process. Roshan is a born storyteller with a compelling vision - to transport her listeners through moonlit scenes of waltzes on cobblestones and rain drenched embraces; sometimes with her own music, sometimes with arrangements of Piazzolla, Gade, and Cohen; irreverently cavorting across times and styles, genres and moods, ranging from cinematic classical to European Tango, from the French waltz to the habanera. She talks us through at every step, leading the way as we journey to the bittersweet heart of the 1930s European salon.

Our resident polymath pianist Peter de Jager draws us on a deep dive into the tragicomic archetype of the subversive puppet, with Stravinsky's own piano arrangement of three scenes from his iconic 1911 ballet Petrushka, created for pianist Artur Rubinstein in 1921. The composer admitted that he himself could not play it, for want of adequate left-hand technique! PLEXUS then present their newly commissioned world premiere trio, Punch and Judy - a ballet in four scenes for violin, clarinet and piano, by prolific Queensland composer Paul Dean, in which he pays homage to Stravinsky's deranged puppets, Pulcinella and Petrushka, and Milhaud's Scaramouche before them. Finally, to complete the unholy trinity of malevolent marionettes, de Jager returns with master puppeteer Zoë Black to pull (and play!) the strings of Stravinsky's ballet Pulcinella, in a violin and piano version collaboratively reworked with violinist Samuel Dushkin. This Suite Italienne, featuring melodies artfully borrowed from Italian baroque composers Gallo, Monza, and Pergolesi, is an elegant banquet of neoclassical effervescence.

Kym Alexandra Dillon Piano

Kym Alexandra Dillon is an award-winning composer, pianist, and presenter currently based in Melbourne and Geelong. She is continuously engaged across a broad spectrum of genres and contexts, from contemporary classical composition, orchestration and arranging, through to jazz performance, accompanying, community choir leading and public speaking about music. Her original works have been commissioned by many presenters, including Melbourne Symphony Orchestra, Musica Viva, and Melbourne Recital Centre, and her music has been performed in Australia, the U.K., North America, Romania and Italy. Dillon makes her PFSMF debut with a recital of her brand new pieces that invite the listener to explore the mosaic of worlds that a single piano can conjure, celebrating the imagination and the piano's power to evoke. Alongside, she presents works by Franz Liszt and Keith Jarrett, two artists whom she regards as greatly having influenced her sound. Dillon's arrestingly beautiful compositions and mesmerising playing create an atmosphere of exquisite enchantment.

Chopin wrote at least 59 Mazurkas, inspired by the traditional Polish dance Mazur. They were composed steadily throughout his life, perhaps as entries in a personal musical journal or diary. Festival Co-Director Stefan Cassomenos presents a group of seven, capturing a moment in Chopin's life – having just completed his Op 50 No 3, contemplating the future, casting his mind back to his first published set from 1830-31 on the cusp of leaving his Polish homeland for Paris, recounting the years and Mazurkas in between, before finding the resolve to write his next Mazurka, Op 56 No 1.

PLEXUS then present the world premiere of their newly commissioned Trio from luminary Melbourne composer Lee Bradshaw – an impassioned work emerging from a deeply personal landscape, shaped by the composer's strong familial ties to his mother's Eastern European heritage, and the complex experience of cultural identity as an Australian-born artist.

Both Chopin and Bradshaw channel a profound sense of longing and displacement, reflecting the subtle but persistent ache of belonging to a culture that is both intimately familiar and yet, at times, just out of reach.

Nicholas Pollock Theorbo

Farrago delves into the authentic music-making of the baroque theorbo player. At a moment's notice, these musicians might be asked to play a piece from an opera or a recent ballet, improvise, compose a new piece, or even perform music originally intended for another instrument. Theorbo mastermind Nicholas Pollock devises an ingenious program capturing that experience – the selected pieces have been arranged, composed, and stolen to please the ear of the discerning listener, featuring music from 17th and 18th century Europe. Much of the music presented here has never been performed

on the theorbo, ranging from the well-known J. S. Bach to the lesserknown but equally brilliant Carl F. Abel. We discover enchanting pieces by Philipp H. Erlebach and Johann C. F. Fischer, reimagined for an instrument forced by its tuning and quirks to transcend the complexities of baroque counterpoint. Presented alongside are works from some of the most notable theorbo players of the era, such as Giovanni G. Kapsperger, Alessandro Piccinini, and Robert de Visée - drawn from the rich farrago of baroque music.



Peter Rose – celebrated poet, playwright, actor, biographer and editor of *Australian Book Review* for 24 years – is also well known as one of Melbourne's most prolific and erudite music critics.

He joins Festival Co-Director Monica Curro in conversation about music, his extensive body of creative work, his fascinating life's journey (beginning with being the son of Collingwood champion Bob Rose) and his seventh and latest collection of poetry, *Attention, Please!*

REVELATIONS OF ETERNAL ECSTASY

Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra Principal Cellist Jonathan Békés and Festival Co-Director Stefan Cassomenos unite to transport us to an alternate temporal continuum with three composers' expressions of hypnotic soundscapes. Inspired by a text from the Book of Revelation – "that there shall be time no longer" – Messiaen's transcendent *Quartet for the End of Time* was composed while he was interned in a German prisoner-of-war camp. In this fifth movement, the tempo marking is "infinitely slow, ecstatic", and in its "Praise for the Eternity of Jesus" invokes a suspension of time as we experience it – in the presence of The Divine. Fêted Australian composer Maria Grenfell takes her inspiration from surrealist artist René Magritte's "Time Transfixed" – a painting of a steam train emerging from a domestic fireplace, at once thermodynamic and frozen in the stasis of the artwork. Poulenc's gorgeous and rarely performed Sonata provides a nostalgic snapshot of a bygone Parisian era, with the characteristic fragrances of dance halls, cafés and salons. The sublime *Cavatina* provides an unearthly moment of reflective stillness, before thrusting us back to the carefree antics of the "real" world.

Renaissance man Aaron Wyatt is an accomplished violist, conductor, composer, programmer and academic. The first Indigenous Australian to conduct a state symphony orchestra in concert, he has conducted for MSO, ASO, SSO, WA Opera, and Perth Festival. He is Director of Ensemble Dutala, Australia's first First Nations chamber ensemble. A long-term member of the award-winning Decibel New Music ensemble, he is also the developer behind the Decibel ScorePlayer app, the group's cutting edge, animated graphic notation software for the iPad.

Wyatt curates a prismatic retrospective of recent commissions for major presenters, composed for diverse instrumental combinations, and highlighting his variegated musical and conceptual interests – including the interplay of sound, the emergent poetic vision to which this gives way, glimpses of awe and beauty in the natural world, its fragility and its interaction with the human impact of our modern existence, and notions of community and of the freedom to be who we really are. Shimmering soundscapes depict lush canopies of forest, canvases of deep azure, the piercing first light of dawn, and the dramatic colours of blazing sunrise.



Bells have reverberated throughout human culture for at least 5000 years, from the earliest surviving ceramic ling in Neolithic China to the colossal Tsarsky Kolokol of Moscow – serving an infinity of deeply human purposes, with which our imagination associates them. The long history of their use as musical instruments struck a turning point with the evolution of the modern handbell in late 1600s England, and the birth of a new and uniquely synergistic genre of music-making – ensembles of handbell ringers seamlessly integrating to act as one instrument.

Minnesota-born Suzanne Brimacomb, Director and Conductor of the Ring of Bells, moved to Port Fairy in 2017 after completing an extensive career in music education, bringing with her a magnificent 3-octave chromatic set of Schulmerich bronze handbells. The evolution of the Ring of Bells has been due to a determined and dedicated group of women from the surrounds of Southwest Victoria. These players share the heavenly sonorities and deep seeded vibrational connections these magical bells possess.

The Ring of Bells combine with a vivid montage of instruments and voices to present a collection of traditional tunes that echo across generations – interspersed with more recent works they have inspired – including the Shaker song *Simple Gifts*, reclaimed English folk melody *Wondrous Love*, the anonymous round *Dona Nobis Pacem – Song of Peace*, and a Quaker setting of the famous 14th century words from Mother Julian of Norwich, *All Will Be Well*.

Moonlite tells this true-crime queer love story in the form of a 90-minute oratorio for voices, percussion and viola, effortlessly transcending musical genres to paint a picture of Victoria's own star-crossed lovers, set uniquely in our Gold-rush-era past.

Winner of the Albert Maggs composition prize, this powerful work is presented in its Australian premiere season by Homophonic! – a leading voice championing queer classical music in performance, regional touring, and commissioning since 2011.



On the fertile banks of the Río de la Plata, circa 150 years ago, a primordial plasma of rhythmic and harmonic energy conceived an immortal spirit - a genie that could not be contained, that reversecolonised Europe, then the rest of the planet, spawned numerous sub-genres, and permanently implanted its DNA into the core genome of human culture. Irresistibly attractive - the offspring of its many multi-racial parents including Milonga, Habanera, and Candombe which variously trace their musical roots to Africa, Spain, Cuba, and the indigenous peoples of Uruguay and Argentina - its destiny was to become synonymous with Astor Piazzolla (1921-1992) in whose hands it absorbed the polyphony of Bach and other classical influences. In the early 2020s lockdown era, while we all collected dust, it continued to multiply, infecting all six ravishing movements of Take Me Along by Australia's own queen of this genre, Elena Kats-Chernin. And to lead us in tonight's celebration, our very own internationally renowned king of the virtuoso classical accordion, Scotland-born Sydney-based James Crabb, heads up an all-star cast for an intoxicating body-and-soul immersion in TANGO.






